Course Description

Geography is an inherently interdisciplinary field of study that draws from both the physical and social sciences to examine the relationships between people and their environment. This course will provide the fundamental terms, concepts, and theories of Geography and show how they are applied in everyday life. We will also examine the relationships between the natural, social, and built environments. This course is divided into three parts: the first part will cover basic geographic concepts and earth science; the second part will focus on environmental studies and examine interactions between people and their environment; and the third part will look at various subdisciplines of Human Geography.

This course can be applied to either Hunter Common Core Individual and Society (Social Science) requirements, or Stage 2B (non-W) of the GER.

- Describe the basic concepts, terms, and theories of Geography.
- Explain physical and social phenomena utilizing a geographic perspective.
- Identify tools and techniques used to for geographic data collection and analysis.

Quizzes

You will complete a short quiz for each topic based on readings and corresponding lectures. These quizzes will consist of questions addressing a range of topics and concepts covered in each chapter. These quizzes are given in Blackboard and will remain open for the duration of the corresponding topic's lecture. Quizzes will disappear from Blackboard at the end of the day (11:59pm) of a topic's scheduled completion. A total of 10 quizzes will be given worth 30% of your final grade. Make-up quizzes will not be given.

Exams

You will take a total of three exams throughout the semester: two mid-semester exams and a final exam. The first and second exams are worth 20% each and the final exam worth 30% of your total grade. Unless a force of nature prevents us from sticking to the course schedule, the exam dates on the syllabus are set. Make up exams will only be given if you provide approved documentation.
