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Course Description:

Spatial analysis of functions of metropolitan areas. Social and economic characteristics of cities and suburbs. Urban land use and the impact of globalization, transportation, and telecommunications.

Learning Objectives:

This course will introduce students to the basics of urban geography, such as definition of cities (including Urban Areas, MSAs, and Micropolitan Statistical Areas in the U.S.), central place theory, urban systems, and traditional models of urban spatial structure (including concentric Zone Model, Sector Model, Multiple Nuclei Model, and Urban Realms Model). More importantly, students will be exposed to contemporary urban topics such as global cities, urban economic restructuring, spatial and skill mismatch, homelessness, telecommuting, suburban growth models, and metropolitan governance and planning. Emphasis will be placed on the urban experience of developed countries, especially the U.S., although urban issues and models such as false urbanization and the Model of Latin American Cities are also discussed.

Prerequisite:

GEOG 101, GEOG 150, or permission of instructor.

Course Evaluation:

1. A make-up exam for the Midterm or Final requires instructor's consent ahead of time and will be given in an oral exam format in instructor's office during office hours.

Undergraduate students are required to write a 3-page (double spaced) review of two related articles published in an academic journal since 2004 and make a 5 to 7 minutes presentation to the class. Graduate students are required to write a 5-page (double spaced) review of five related articles published in an academic journal since 2004 and make a 8 to 10 minutes presentation to the class.
3. Information (including author, year of publication, title, and journal) on the articles selected for the review is due by November 6.
4. A hard copy of the paper is due by Dec. 11. Late papers will be marked down 5% each day.
5. Student presentations will be in the last two weeks of classes. Presentation date of each student will be announced in class at the end of November. Presentation make-up is not guaranteed and is allowed only if there is time available at the end of the class. Students who did not present or did not get the chance to make up the presentation will receive no point for presentation.
6. Only students averaging C or above in the course are eligible to request an incomplete grade. Granting incompletes to eligible students is at the discretion of the instructor.
7. Class attendance is mandatory. Missing more than three classes in a semester, regardless the reasons, will adversely affect your grade. Students are responsible for obtaining any information presented in class during an absence.
