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Course Overview:

The general theme of this course could be entitled Geography, the relationship game. Geography is very much about relationships and in this course, we will establish a scientific framework for reasoning about relationships such as spatial coincidence, distance, vicinity, scale, geometry and attributes, geographic features and their representation on a map, etc. Hand-in-hand with each of the relationships, you will learn how to apply your knowledge using geographic information system (GIS) tools.

Goals: Familiarize students with a set of spatial concepts and GIS tools to implement them.

Objectives: Enable abstraction of everyday geographic observations to put them to use in a spatial decision-making context.

Outcomes: By the end of this course, you will be able to

- distinguish different GIS data models and formats and identify how they can be analyzed using GIS
- 2. describe and design a GIS production process from data modeling and acquisition to editing, analysis, and cartographic output.
- 3. work independently with GIS, determine what is easy to do with GIS, what will take you considerable amounts of time, and which spatial research questions do not lend themselves to a GIS solution.
